#### Senior Privilege Program - Exemption from Course Finals

Seniors will have the opportunity at the end of the school year to exempt themselves from final exams. Any senior who maintains an 85 average for four quarters in a full year class, may choose to exempt themselves from their final exam. To be eligible, students must be in good standing, meet the school's attendance criteria, maintain at least an 80 average in the fourth quarter, but as previously stated, an overall average of 85 is required. Any student wishing to take a final exam despite meeting the criteria may do so.

The mid-term and final exams were created to assess student comprehension of material, as well as to simulate expectations of college exams. The final exam for seniors comes at a time when students have received college acceptances, so that the exams carry very little meaning for students other than to fulfill a requirement. Also, the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter is almost three weeks shorter, due to graduation and final exams, requiring teachers to commit to a frantic pace to cover the expected material. The feeling is that an 85 average provides students with an incentive to work toward. It does not penalize any student, because any senior wishing to take a final or a student who must take a final to improve his/her grade may do so. Other districts have instituted this senior privilege with 65 to 70 percent of the seniors achieving this goal.

The attempt is to provide a senior privilege / incentive to motivate seniors to continue to work hard until year's end.

during regularly scheduled classes and students will have the opportunity to ask questions about specific course requirements for graduation. Students will be told that they may schedule a private meeting with their counselor as well to discuss any concerns they may have. The guidance counselors have given each student in grade 8 a copy of *The 9th Grade Program of Studies 2010-2011*. **The entire Program of Studies Booklet can be obtained on the FHS website.** www.foxborough.k12.ma.us

Each student will also be given a personalized information sheet listing the courses for which they have been recommended for next year. They will be asked to review this information very carefully with you. Please spend time to discuss these recommendations with your child. Teachers made these recommendations diligently.

Consideration was given to your child's current abilities and willingness to work independently. Your child's courses should be challenging and demanding. If you are not in agreement with the recommendation, please call the teacher before February 12, 2010, to discuss the recommendation. After you discuss the recommendation with the teacher and a change is requested, the parents as well as the student will sign an override sheet and the teacher will then notify your child's guidance counselor of any course change.

As your child completes his or her required courses, there will be more of an opportunity to enroll in elective courses. Every effort will be made to honor your child's requests. Some courses may not be offered next year due to limited enrollment and conflicts. Notification of any cancelled courses will be made as soon as the total enrollment has been verified.

A program for parents will be held on **Tues. Feb. 09, 2010** in the high school auditorium. (*Grade 8– 6:30 p.m. – 7:30 p.m.*) (*Grades 9–11 – 7:30 p.m. – 8:30 p.m.*) Requirements for graduation will be explained and guidance personnel will also be available to answer any questions.

It is very important that the completed and signed Course Request Form be returned to the homeroom teachers by February 12, 2010.

If your child fails to return the signed form, his or her courses for next year cannot be scheduled; and/or the electives that he or she may want to choose may be unavailable. Please help to make this a smooth process, resulting in a schedule for your child, which will ensure his or her academic success.

During the next few weeks, middle school and high school guidance counselors will explain the course selection process to students in grades 8 through 11. Group meetings will be held

## Foxborough High School student set to play at Grammys

For a young trumpet player not yet out of high school, Matt Muirhead's gig schedule is full for the next couple of months.

Muirhead, a standout with the Foxborough High School Jazz Ensemble, Concert Band and other groups, leaves for California today to play with an elite student jazz band as part of the 52nd annual Grammy Awards celebration. And from Feb. 12-15, Muirhead will be with a Foxborough High jazz quintet competing in the annual Charles Mingus Jazz Competition in NY. The 17-year-old, who began playing trumpet in fifth grade, enjoys all types of music, but is heavily focused on jazz.

"Jazz provides a level of intimacy, democracy and interaction that you don't necessarily feel in other genres," said Muirhead, whose influences include Miles Davis, Louis Armstrong and Wynton Marsalis.



Muirhead, who also studied piano, discovered jazz in middle school under the tutelage of teacher George Murphy. He never looked back.

"I just fell in love with it right away," said Muirhead, a trumpet student of Ron Christianson.

Muirhead, who hopes to become a professional musician, said he's more than excited about playing with the 2010 Grammy Jazz Ensemble, which is made up of top music students from across the country.

Students will perform at a number of Grammy Week events, including venues that will showcase them alongside such

jazz stars as Mindi Abair and Brian Culbertson.

So that Matt will look spiffy, Deluxe Tux of Walpole is providing his wardrobe for the trip.

The Grammy Jazz Ensembles also will perform at the 20th anniversary MusiCares Person of the Year tribute on Jan. 29 honoring Neil Young.

Students will also record a CD and attend the Grammy Awards on Jan. 31 and perform at the Grammy afterparty.

In addition, participating students are also eligible for more than \$2 million in college scholarships.

Next month, Matt Muirhead will join fellow students Brendan Thomas, Ian Ayers, Christian Lyman and Connor Schultze in traveling to New York City for the Feb. 12-15 Mingus competition at the Manhattan School of Music.

The student-directed band will be competing against finalists from The Rivers School in Weston and Rio Americano High School in Sacramento, Calif., playing the music of the legendary jazz pianist, bandleader and composer. School Music Director Steve Massey said he's especially proud of Muirhead and the other students' accomplishment in entering and attaining a finalist position at the second annual Mingus competition.

Students took the lead in suggesting a Foxborough entry and rehearsed on their own beginning last summer using their own arrangements.

The jazz quintet is one of several small student combos playing many different types of music, Massey said.

Besides the most recent honors, Muirhead has twice participated along with the Foxborough High Jazz Ensemble at the Ellington High School Jazz Competition in New York City and is a member of the district and all-state bands.

Muirhead, whose father Matt plays guitar and sister Katie is a violinist, credits his family for getting behind his musical efforts.

"Whatever type of music it is, they've always supported me, come to my concerts and they tell me what they think of what I'm playing," he said.

## **English Department News!**

From Ms. Laura Cronin, English Department Head

The **English Department** has some exciting news to share with the school and community. Over the summer of 2009, a group of English teachers met in order to think about the possibility of offering more electives to our students. As a result, the department has developed some new and interesting courses that will run for the first time in 2009-10!

The most dramatic change to the curriculum will occur for next year's senior class. Although seniors will be able to fulfill the English requirement with either Advanced Placement Literature or British Literature, they will also have the option of fulfilling that requirement through of the following courses: Real World Literature, Media Literacy, The Tides of War, Lyrics and Literature, Science Fiction, Film and Novel, Modern Fiction, or Irish Literature and Culture. Specific information regarding each course can be found in the **Program of Studies**, which is available online.

Students at other grade levels will also have the opportunity to "try out" the department's newest electives – Young Adult Literature and Young Adult Literature II. All students, including the seniors, still have quite a menu of electives to choose from – including Journalism, Creative Writing, Public Speaking/ Speech and Debate, Theatre Arts and SAT/MCAS Review.

Reading and writing skills are core competencies that help students to perform well in a variety of subject areas. Therefore, the English Department encourages all Foxborough students to strongly consider enrolling in an English elective next year.

However, if your child does not have "room" in his or her schedule for an elective, please know that there are a number of off campus educational opportunities – ranging from drama classes at the Orpheum Theater to Writing Seminars at Bard College – that have been publicized to our department. In addition, there are on-campus opportunities – most notably, the addition of two English tutors to our staff – for students to improve their reading and writing skills. On Tuesday, March 9, 2010 students from the high school will be attending a Future Nursing Day at Sturdy Memorial Hospital. These students will able to hear from professionals in many of the areas located in a hospital such as: radiology, emergency medicine, pediatrics, physical therapy and nursing. The group of students who are selected to participate have identified nursing or a career in the medical field as their career direction.

On Thursday, March 25, 2010 students from the high school will be attending a Future Teacher's Day at Bridgewater State College. This event was started in 2008 in partnership with Bridgewater State College. The students attending the event will be exposed to a variety of different speakers and activities. Students will get the chance to talk with educators and spend time in a classroom setting giving them firsthand experience on what it's like to be a teacher.

If your son or daughter is interested in either of these programs please have them speak to Mrs. Pillsbury in the guidance office.

On Wednesday, April 14, 2010, the Attleboro Area School-to-Career Partnership along with Foxborough High School will be sponsoring a *Credit For Life Fair* at Gillette Stadium for two hundred and fifty seniors from Foxboro, Attleboro, North Attleboro, and Norton. The purpose of the event is to teach the students how to make a personal financial budget. During their junior year, the students were taught the basics about budgeting and the Credit For Life Fair gives these students an opportunity to put these lessons to work.

The Credit For Life Fair is an interactive event that allows students to role play as an adult trying to manage a budget. Each student is given a personalized profile that reflects the income and debt picture of an entry level professional in a career that the student is interested in pursuing. objective is to visit each of the fair's thirteen booths, which represent the major categories of living expenses, and develop a working budget. They will have to decide if they should rent an apartment or buy a house, buy a new or used car, and allocate money for food, clothing, and health care. This Credit For Life Fair will reinforce the need for the students to be aware of how much money they have, where and how they spend their money and most importantly the difficult spending decisions that they will have to make in their lives. Once they have visited all of the booths, the student will meet with a volunteer financial planner/credit counselor who reviews their budget with them, answering any questions, discussing where the student performed well and assisting them in finding solutions to possible problem areas.

We are excited about this event. Timothy P. Cahill, Massachusetts State Treasurer, will be there as the kick-off speaker. We expect both local newspapers, the Boston Globe and TV stations to report on the event. Similar programs that have run in surrounding communities have generated a lot of student enthusiasm and were enjoyed by the booth volunteers.

Several local businesses have pledged their support for this program and have graciously made financial donations. This event is only possible with the help and generosity of our local community.

## THE GILDER LEHRMAN INSTITUTE of AMERICAN HISTORY

#### Civil War Era Political Cartoons Cast Vivid, Complex Views of Lincoln in Gilder Lehrman Institute's New Exhibition

New York, NY (September 1, 2009)—The Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History's national touring panel exhibition, Looking at Lincoln: Political Cartoons from the Civil War Era, will visit six sites this fall, including the Ludington Area Center for the Arts in Ludington, Michigan. The exhibition focuses on images of Abraham Lincoln through the sometimes scathing wit of the political cartoonists of his time, giving visitors the opportunity to set aside their current assumptions of Lincoln and see the man through the eyes of his contemporaries.

As Americans continue to weigh the legacy of slavery, Looking at Lincoln: Political Cartoons from the Civil War Era allows viewers to explore the issue as it appeared in newspapers during the Civil War era. Without television, radio, or the Internet, Americans relied on the political cartoons in newspapers to express and literally draw out the tensions of the time. Sometimes sharp and offensive, the images of Lincoln offered in this exhibition reveal an America deeply entrenched in racism juxtaposed with one of the exhibition's highlights: a copy of a rare printing of the Emancipation Proclamation signed by Abraham Lincoln from the Gilder Lehrman Collection.

Looking at Lincoln focuses on the election of 1860, the Emancipation Proclamation, and the legacy of the emancipation as it carries through today. Developed by GLI and curated by Susan F. Saidenberg, director of exhibitions, with Abigail Burns, program coordinator, this national touring exhibition is made possible by funding from the Gilder Lehrman Institute.

Founded in 1994, the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History actively promotes the study and love of American history. The Institute serves teachers, students, scholars, and the general public in creating history-centered schools, organizing seminars and programs for educators, producing print and electronic publications and traveling exhibitions, sponsoring lectures by eminent historians, and administering a History Teacher of the Year Award in every state. The Institute awards the Lincoln, Frederick Douglass, and George Washington Book Prizes, and offers fellowships for scholars to work in the Gilder Lehrman Collection.

The Institute maintains two award-winning websites, <a href="https://www.gilderlehrman.org">www.gilderlehrman.org</a> and the quarterly online journal <a href="https://www.historynow.org">www.historynow.org</a>.


