The June Foxworthy will be our last newsletter for this school year. On behalf of the administration, faculty, and staff, I would like to thank all our students and parents for once again working together to make the 2009-2010 school years safe and productive.

To the class of 2010, we wish you well in your future endeavors. Don't forget as part of the Foxborough Family, we look forward to having you visit us from time to time to share your college or work experiences. That way, we may continue to find ways to support your efforts and needs.

Final schedules will be mailed out in June to all returning students. Students should check to verify that they have received the correct courses. Report any concerns to the guidance office so corrections can be made as quickly as possible. A final schedule with teachers and room assignments will be issued to students on the first day of school.

Students who are taking advanced placement courses will be required to complete some assignments over the summer. If a student finds himself/herself struggling with the work or not attempting the work, he/she may want to re-think whether they will stay in that particular AP course. Requesting a course change in July or August is better than waiting until the first day of school. The guidance staff will do it's best to place the student in the desired level and course, but placement is not guaranteed.

We have repeatedly stressed the importance of carefully selecting courses to avoid scheduling changes. It is important to us that we schedule courses that will best meet each student's needs.

Report cards will be mailed home approximately one week after school ends. Any student needing to attend summer school will be notified by the guidance office within two days after the end of school.

The second phase of the building renovation project will move into full swing on June $23^{\text {rd }}$. This phase will include
the removal of asbestos from the first floor, replacement of the heating and ventilation systems, gutting and modernizing the science labs, replacing windows and roofing. It will be a very ambitious schedule, and the timely coordination of the various contractors will be critical to finishing the renovations before school begins in September.

With the exception of the administrative offices, every other department and any summer program will be relocated to the Ahern School. If you need to speak to a guidance counselor, call the guidance office at the high school and listen to the message from Ms. Eileen Warnat (guidance secretary) to determine from which building guidance counselors will be working. Any questions can also be answered by calling the main office (508-543-1616 or 1617).

Each band was chosen by a panel of judges composed of distinguished jazz musicians and historians Jazz at Lincoln Center's Artistic Director WYNTON MARSALIS; composer, conductor, and Ellington authority DAVID BERGER; leading Mary Lou Williams scholar TED BUEHRER; legendary jazz saxophonist and composer/arranger JIMMY HEATH; and bassist and educator RODNEY WHITAKER- from among the 15 finalist bands that came to the Competition \& Festival in New York City.


At the awards ceremony, Wynton Marsalis presented prizes and cash awards to each of the 15 finalist bands. Stephen C. Massey, Director of the Foxborough High School Jazz Band, accepted the

3rd place trophy and an award of $\$ 1,000$. The remaining 11 finalist bands and winning community ensemble were awarded certificates of merit and cash awards of $\$ 500$. ## American Writers' Day

On April $27^{\text {th }}$, members of the junior class were able to meet with and learn from several American Writers as part of American Writers' Day. Funded by FACES grant, American Writers Day featured five authors: Beth Daley of the Boston Globe; Thomas Flynn, author of Bikeman; Fran Larkin, author of 5 Words and then Some; Michael Atwood, author of History of Santa Monica, and poet Pamela Sneed. The diverse experiences of each author allowed students not only to learn about the profession of writing but also to discover more about both US History and the world around them. Many of the authors were world travelers, and therefore they were able to describe places ranging from California to New York to Honduras. Ms. Daley was able to discuss her experiences covering the war in Afghanistan, while Mr. Flynn talked about his experiences covering the tragedy of September $11^{\text {th }}$. After the event, all of the American writers commented about how impressed they were with the students of Foxborough High School. They were particularly complimentary as they recalled the high level of questions that FHS students asked.

## soon to be 9th graders

On June $11^{\text {th }}, 8^{\text {th }}$ graders will be coming to the high school for a tour from 10:30-12:30. The students will be meeting the administrators, the athletic director and get information about clubs offered at the high school. They will have lunch at the high school and then returning to the Ahern. Summer reading requirements will be handed out.


What you should be doing before school ends.....

1. Complete a "Brag Sheet". You may obtain one in the Guidance Office. This should be completed now to the best of your ability and handed in to your Guidance Counselor prior to leaving for the summer. Keep one or two copies for future use with teachers.
2. Ask one of your teachers for a letter of recommendation which you will need in September.
3. Visit some local colleges - large, small, public and private. Get a feel for what works for YOU.
4. If you are considering military (an academy) or an ROTC Scholarship begin the process before leaving for the summer. You need to begin the application process during the SUMMER before senior year.
5. Make an appointment with Mr. O'Neil during a study, lunch or after school to discuss colleges.
6. Make an appointment with Mr. O'Neil and your parent(s) / guardian on Thursday evening to discuss colleges.


## What you should be doing during the summer... Yes the summer!

1. Look at and prepare your responses for the 2010 - 2011 COMMON APPLICATION.
2. Begin your essay...create an excellent DRAFT using the Common Application questions (page \#5).
3. Check Common Application Supplements to see if your colleges require a Supplement.
4. Complete a resume through the format on Naviance or College Board if you need a resume.
5. Complete the first step of the NCAA Eligibility process...online.
6. VISIT...VISIT...VISIT colleges as often as possible.
7. Return to school in September with 6-10 colleges you believe are appropriate for you.


REMINDER: first testing dates for ACT (September 11 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ ) and SAT (October $9^{\text {th }}$ ) require registration in August and early September...check www.actstudent.org and www.collegeboard.com for details and dates.

## COLLEGE ADMMSSION GLOSSARY

BRAG SHEET - Also known as a Recommendation Data Sheet (available in Guidance). This document allows students to provide information that is used by teachers and counselors to write a letter of recommendation.

## LETTER OF RECOMMENDATION - A letter of

 endorsement. Most colleges require two letters of recommendation: one from a guidance counselor and one from a teacher.POST GRADUATE PROGRAM (OR P.G.) - A year of study between high school and college. This often gives a student an opportunity to mature and to improve academically.

EARLY ACTION - An admission program that allows you to apply EARLY (often November $1^{\text {st }}$ or $15^{\text {th }}$, sometimes December $1^{\text {st }}$ ) and to receive a NON-BINDING early decision. You do not need to accept until May $1^{\text {st }}$ and you may apply to other colleges under regular admission programs. Early Action applicant pools are often more competitive.

EARLY DECISION - An admission program that allows you to apply EARLY (often November $1^{\text {st }} / 15^{\text {th }}$ or December $1^{\text {st }}$ ) to one college only (your first choice) for an early admission decision from the college. The decision is binding which means you must agree to enroll if you are accepted, pay a non-refundable deposit, and withdraw applications from all other colleges. Individual policies vary from college to college so check with each school.

ROLLING ADMISSION - An admission policy used by many colleges to admit freshman students. A college reviews applications as they are received and offers a decision within 4 to 8 weeks. This can be as useful as EARLY ACTION.

FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) Most schools use this form to determine financial aid. The form cannot be filled out before January $1^{\text {st }}$ and must be completed every year that a student is seeking aid. The form requires both student and parent information.

CSS Profile Form - Financial Aid Form required by SOME private colleges in addition to the FAFSA.

GPA - Grade point average. One of the determining factors in college acceptance. Foxborough High School uses a Weighted GPA, which is explained in the school profile.

GRANT/SCHOLARSHIP - Financial aid that does not need to be paid back.

NCAA - A national organization governing college athletic programs.

SAT (Scholastic Aptitude Test) A reasoning test that measures critical reading, writing and math. Though still required by most colleges, some are dropping it as an admission criterion (www.collegeboard.com).

ACT (American College Test) A reasoning test that may be accepted in place of the SAT or in place of Subject Tests by some colleges (www.actstudent.org).

TRANSCRIPT - The official record of a student's academic history.
